Topic

CARE presentation (Bill Flinn)

- Partnership with MORDI and Live and Learn
- Shelter and WASH combined program: households rely on rainwater for drinking water – shelter/WASH for rainwater harvesting.
- 'Eua observations: variety of damage, peopled doing different things at different times, no one size fits all solution.
- Early self-recovery kit.
- Further support to vulnerable/total collapse.
- Training and accompaniment roving teams, awareness training in shelter/hygiene
- Training for women.
 Support to self-recovery: not enough to build a house but will support/encourage ongoing recovery processes.

Tonga Shelter Cluster 1

CARE will focus on meeting needs in 'Eua.

NEMO update (Leveni Oha)

- Ongoing development of a shelter response plan (currently before cabinet) with the aim of reaching everyone, especially focussing on vulnerable people/households.
- Most people now have emergency shelter tent, tarp, shelter kit. It is time to look at the next phase promoting/supporting self-recovery.
- Need to ensure the response is equitable in terms of geographical coverage and that agencies respond in a similar way.
- Initial government view is that the value of response options would be 1500 TOP for partially damaged, 3000 TOP for destroyed houses.
- Need for shelter/WASH collaboration.
- Still in cyclone season, so BBS messaging will be important.

Caritas Update (Amelia Maafu)

- Caritas has been working in emergency phase, distributing tarps in coordination with NEMO.
- Observation that older houses were worst affected no bracing, strapping, no recent renovations.
- Questions:
 - How does support to self-recovery relate to the building code?
 - Are there options for cash distribution?
 - Importance of communicating with communities through MIA?

PASSA (Lua Maea – Habitat for Humanity Aotearoa)

- Habitat for Humanity can offer PASSA training.
- PASSA (Participatory Approaches to Safe Shelter Awareness) is a community engagement process that looks at how communities can become more resilient.
- Can be offered alongside support to housing to assist the wider community in identifying and addressing potental risk.
