Sittwe Township

1 - Say Tha Mar Gyi IDP Camp (estimated 11,725 residents)

Issue

- CAMP MANAGEMENT: Ongoing information gathering, sharing and daily access to services monitoring. Community consultations on kitchen refurbishment. Follow-up on shelters vacated by the group who moved to OTG-W due to threats from STMG CMC / Host Community, shelters are now occupied by other families.
 - SHELTER: Remains priority concern for IDPs in camp, very worried about upcoming rainy season. Some moved from damaged shelters to those vacated by the group who moved to OTG-W.
- ➤ WASH: Ongoing regular activities by CDN: latrine and camp cleaning, construction of concrete drainage. Oxfam is numbering boreholes and checking the latrines. Latrines need repair; damaged and stolen hand pumps need repair/replacement.
- ➤ HEALTH: MHAA and MRF operated a clinic during 3 week days (Mon, Wed, Fri). No major health concerns reported.
- FOOD: Food distribution completed for May. IDPs report lack of information about food delivery and distribution dates for June.
- EDUCATION: All TLSs are running 5 days per week. School kits have been provided this week.
- NON-FOOD ITEM: UNHCR met with CMC Members about the use of DRC CCCM Household survey for NFI distribution planned to take place very soon.
- o PROTECTION: IPAs distributed to monthly caseload of most vulnerable.
- NUTRITION: Ongoing activities by SCI and ACF, monitoring, referrals, group work and counselling. Data collection on child malnutrition, health education for mothers of children under 5.
- CHILD PROTECTION: CP activities ongoing; all CFSs operational. Reports of armed security police entering a CFS near the security on several occasions; children feeling afraid. This was reported to Village Administrator but no action was taken to address the issue.

<u>Status</u>

- -Lists of Beneficiaries HH continue to pose challenges for distributions in the camp. -DRC advise contract agreed and works to commence in camps in next two weeks.
- food concerns reported to WFP – No Update at time of reporting.
- -Request for school kits forwarded to UNICEF last week in meeting.
- -NFI sector is following-up.

-DRC CCCM reported to SCI Child Protection, coordinating joint response.

<u>Issue</u>

- CAMP MANAGEMENT: Ongoing regular activities, information sharing, information gathering and daily access to services monitoring.
 - SHELTER MAINTENANCE: shelter roofs are badly damaged throughout the camp, as well as floors in some shelters; IDPs state majority have to use tarpaulins.
- WASH: Regular activities ongoing; health education on AWD; camp and latrines cleaning, full latrines have been desludged.
- HEALTH: No clinic in the camp (PYK considered as part of STMG camp), difficulty accessing clinics in other camps due to distance and transportation costs. Repeated request for clinic to be operated within PYG.
- > FOOD: Food distribution completed for May. IDPs report lack of information about

- NON-FOOD ITEM: Continued complaints regarding no complete NFI core kits distributed since the establishment of this camp. IDPs report lack of basic essentials. UNHCR arrived and informed that will provide NFI Kits but could not confirm the date of distribution.
- NUTRITION: Regular activities ongoing; data collection of children <5. SCI provided maternity blouses to every pregnant women in the camp.
- CHILD PROTECTION: Regular activities ongoing, all CFSs operational, no updates.

- -WFP conducted meeting with IDPs regarding concerns, awaiting update.
- -Cases registered and being addressed.
- -NFI sector is following-up.

4 - Phwe Yar Gone Village (estimated 2,400 residents)

5 - Pa Lin Pyin Muslim Village (estimated 1,400 residents)

Issue

- WASH: Health education on AWD ongoing.
- PROTECTION: Continued tensions with neighbouring Rakhine village following the census; fishermen unable to access usual fishing areas. No update re: problems at the nearby checkpoint after demanding to be registered as Rohingya in the census.
- No other updates.

6 - Pa Lin Pyin Rakhine Village (estimated 1,300 residents)

Issue

- ➤ WASH: Health education on AWD ongoing.
- PROTECTION: Partial delivery of generator items to provide electricity to the village as part of community protection assistance.
- No other updates.

Status

-Work on provision of electricity by DRC Protection is on-going.

7 - Ohn Taw Gyi North IDP Camp (estimated 13,000 residents)

<u>Issue</u>

- > SECURITY: 3 hand pumps were stolen, which was reported to CMC who failed to take action due to fear of those who stole the pumps.
- CAMP MANAGEMENT: Ongoing regular activities, information sharing, information gathering and daily access to services monitoring.
 - SHELTER MAINTENANCE: shelter roofs are badly damaged throughout the camp, as well as floors in some shelters; water leaked into shelters during the rain.
- WASH: Regular activities ongoing by SI and CDN; cleaning latrines and camp, monitoring WASH facilities; assessment and numbering of hand pumps. Data collection by CDN about renovation of solar panels in front of latrines. Some latrines and hand pumps still in need of repair. (See additional concerns under PROTECTION below)
- ➤ HEALTH: MHAA and Mercy Malaysia opened clinic 2 days per week.
- ➤ DEATHS¹: no death reported this week.

- -Roof repair work by DRC is expected to begin before end-May - Request use distributed tarpaulins.
- -WASH Cluster is currently assessing all WASH components in Sittwe camps
- -No update re: complaints

- ➤ PROTECTION: In a meeting with women main concerns were reported as: lack of sanitary towels and underwear; lack of contraceptive and maternity care; insufficient healthcare; NFI distributions (hygiene kits) not reaching IDPs due to host community staying in the camp; need for lighting near latrines prefer personal solar lanterns. IPAs distributed to monthly caseload of most vulnerable.
- NON-FOOD ITEM: Reported concerns that host community members living in the camp receive larger portion of NFIs (hygiene kits) than actual IDPs.
- NUTRITION: OPT operational; regular activities ongoing, including home visits by ACF and referrals by SCI. SCI conducted hygiene promotion for mothers of <5 children. MHAA conducted a meeting about reproductive health and provided some clothes for pregnant women and some food.</p>
- EDUCATION: All TLS are running and registering students for new school year. LWF TLS is still closed.
- CHILD PROTECTION: Regular activities ongoing, CFS operational; no updates.

9 - Ohn Taw Gyi West IDP Camp (estimated 3,200 residents)

Issue

- CAMP MANAGEMENT: Ongoing regular activities, information sharing, information gathering and daily access to services monitoring. Meeting held by CM with IDPs displaced from STMG camp due to threats to safety, currently staying in communal buildings.
 - SHELTER MAINTENANCE: Shelter roofs are badly damaged throughout the camp, as well as floors in some shelters as 2nd priority after roofing.
- WASH: Regular activities ongoing; camp and latrine cleaning, assessment and numbering of hand pumps. Continued complaints from IDPs and still no updates on latrines in need of renovation and hand pumps in need of repair.
- ➤ HEALTH: MHAA opened a clinic one days for 2 hours and saw around 20 patients. IDPs report that current level of access to health is not sufficient. Problems related to bug and mosquito bites were reported to seriously affect most children.
- > FOOD: No updates.
- ➤ PROTECTION: Activities fully operational. Discussions held with men and women: lack of firewood was raised among main concerns, in addition to health and WASH. IPAs distributed to monthly caseload of most vulnerable.
- NUTRITION: Nutrition provided by WFP.
- EDUCATION: All TLS are running and no supporting kits were provided.
- NON-FOOD ITEM: OLARMA, a private donor, provided maternity clothes to pregnant women..
- CHILD PROTECTION: Introductory visit by DRC Child Protection team.

Status

- -DRC CCCM and Protection met with CCCM, PWG and Shelter Cluster Leads for discuss group at risk – plan joint response / coordination with RSG.
- -Roof repair work by DRC is expected to begin nest week request to use tarpaulins distributed.

 - SHELTER MAINTENANCE: shelter concerns remain key concern; roofs are badly damaged throughout the camp.
- WASH: Ongoing regular activities; camp and latrine cleaning, desludging, monitoring WASH activities.
- ➤ HEALTH: MHAA and Mercy Malaysia open clinic 2 days per week.
- DEATHS²: A new born baby and 50 year old man died of unknown causes.
- FOOD: Food distribution for May had finished rice only. WFP will deliver remaining food next week.
- ➤ PROTECTION: New women's group established. Main concerns raised: difficulty accessing health services for emergency, esp. pregnancy related; lack of NFIs; need for electricity near latrines due to safety risks. No updates re: lack of firewood.
- EDUCATION: All TLS start to register students for the new school years. No student kits were provided for new school seasons.
- NON-FOOD ITEM: No NFI core kits distributed since the establishment of the camp. IDP complained that NFIs are distributed in other camps but not in BDP.
- NUTRITION: ACF and SCI nutrition centre is running and provide nutrition assistance. SCI conduct hygiene promotion sessions to mothers of <5 children and provided baby clothes to new born baby and necessary medicine to those children.
- CHILD PROTECTION: Regular activities ongoing, CFSs operational; no updates.

- FOOD: A private donor, MAUK, provided 720 rice bags for IDPs in sector 4 and tent areas.
- NON-FOOD ITEM: No NFI kits been delivered by agencies primary concern, cooking utensils.

Currently reported 3 persons suffering from conditions which require medical referral to hospital (hematemesis, bleeding and infection, appendicitis) but refuse to go to Sittwe hospital due to fear. Widespread skin rash and abscesses reported due to hot season, lack of treatment.

- FOOD: No updates.
- PROTECTION: No updates re: 19 HHs recently arrived from Myebon camp with reportedly no access to aid. In a FGD with women main concerns were raised in relation to health and drinking water access.


