SNFI at a Glance

Who do we serve?

The Shelter and NFI (SNFI) Sector provides support to five population groups: IDPs, returnees, non-displaced, migrants, refugees and asylum seekers.

The sector estimates the number of people in need of assistance in 2021 to be 367,000. This includes 58,000 displaced people, 82,000 returnees, 107,000 non-displaced Libyans, 82,000 migrants and 46,000 refugees.

The highest priority Mantikas are; Tripoli, Benghazi, Ejdabia, Sebha, Wadi Al Shati, Misrata, Sirt, Murzuq, Ubari and Jufra.

What do we do?

To meet the needs, the 2021 HRP SNFI financial requirement is 13.1 M USD of which:

61% is for Essential Household Items for those returning, in detention or subject to secondary displacement. This activity is governed by a sector endorsed guidance note.



Basic Kit

Intended to address basic/urgent needs such as sleeping comfort, storing water, lighting. Used to support populations in areas of transit or for populations "on the move". Designed to provide support to individuals or households within the early stages of displacement or an event that results in needs.



Full Kit

Intended to address basic household needs such as sleeping comfort, storing water, lighting, and providing some protection from the weather. The kit is designed to support individuals or households during the first 3 months of displacement, and can also be used to support long term displaced or affected populations who have limited or no access to basic household items.



Seasonal Kit

Winter and summer seasonal kits are supplementary and designed to ease the impact of the extremes of temperature in Libya. Winter kits include kerosene heater and extra blankets, while summer includes electric fan and cool box.



Rapid Response Mechanism (RRM)

Implemented in Libya since 2019, the RRM is operated by UNICEF, WFP, IOM and UNFPA to provide life-saving emergency relief assistance including food, cash, hygiene kits and NFI to newly displaced within 72 hours of their displacement.



Specialist NFI kits

Falling under the broad umbrella of NFI, kits are designed to meet a specific need created by the context or by the needs of the beneficiaries. This can include kitchen sets, dignity kits or child focused kits.

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Shelter

Adequate Housing

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What do we do?

To meet the needs, the 2021 HRP SNFI financial requirement is 13.1 M USD of which:

34% of the sector's work is focused on providing adequate housing for all population groups through rehabilitation and repair of accommodation and cash for rent.

Cash for Rent

As the main housing solution for all population groups is renting of private accommodation, the Sector supports households to pay their rent and so take control of where they live.

Cash for Shelter repair

To ensure that the beneficiaries are in the driving seat, following a technical assessment by engineers, we provide direct cash to the home-owners so that they can manage their own reconstruction.

Contractor led repair

For some beneficiaries and when the reconstruction needs are significant, following the technical assessment we will directly engage the services of a professional Libyan contractor. We then supervise the works to ensure that the reconstruction is of the highest quality.

Community led repair

In urban areas where we have multiple apartments in a single building, and the damage is to the entire building, we work with the wider community to repair the damage and help make the buildings safe for all.

In-kind materials

When appropriate we supply materials direct to the beneficiaries instead of cash. For example, sealing of kits (SOKs) comprised of essential material enable families to quickly make a damaged building habitable and so start the reconstruction process.



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Public Buildings and Infrastructure

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What do we do?

To meet the needs, the 2021 HRP SNFI financial requirement is 13.1 M USD of which:

5% of the sector's work is related to the repair and rehabilitation of public buildings and infrastructure



Health facilities

Supporting the Health Sector, in 2020/21 we have ramped-up our rehabilitation and expansions of health facilities including isolation facilities to support the humanitarian response to the COVID-19 pandemic.



Community buildings

Working with communities and based on their needs and wishes, we support the reconstruction of all buildings, including schools and recreational spaces, to foster greater social cohesion. Low-cost, rapid, Quick Impact Projects (QIPS) is a key modality.



Roads Infrastructure

Included here are works to improve access to affected communities and settlements and can expand to drainage, footpaths and bridge repair.



Electrical infrastructure

A key service in Libya, essential to sustain recovery and to cope with Libya's harsh climate. Partners have installed generators when necessary but are increasingly switching to solar power.



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
