

MAJOR HIGHLIGHTS

- The sector conducted a needs assessment to determine the extent of severity of humanitarian need at the sub-district level and better inform the overall response of the sector. The assessment revealed that after five years of conflict, the overall access to basic household items among population in need Syria remains challenging despite consistent humanitarian support. The worsening condition is not due to unavailability of essential household materials but attributed to lack of financial means to access these items. This finding validates the continuing relevance and significance of consistent provision and distribution of non-food items especially to the most vulnerable population in hard-to-reach and besieged areas and its neighboring communities. Furthermore, the assessment revealed the need to adhere to minimum standards in providing non-food item assistance especially hygiene kit, baby diapers, winter clothes, adult diapers and blankets which are considered the most important.
- As winter is fast approaching, the sector drafted its winterization plan to ensure a coherent and effective response and making sure that the acute needs of the affected population are met to the highest extent possible while trying to avoid duplication The total target of the sector members in 2016-2017 is to reach around 2.2 million population in need in 12 governorates including hard-to-reach and besieged areas with funding requirement amounting to around 66 million USD.
- Planning for inter-agency and cross-border convoy to deliver humanitarian aid to hard-to-reach and besieged areas continued in August. For the entire month, the sector planned to deliver assistance to more than 900,000 people in need in 32 communities around Syria however, due to insecurity the actual reach remains limited. For UNHCR alone, it has only reached around 20,400 beneficiaries (with more than 4 NFI items) in 3 communities namely East Harasta (Rural Damascus), Alwer and Aldar Al Kabeira (Homs) in August.



GAPS AND CHALLENGES

- Widespread insecurity, challenging physical access and rigorous bureaucratic procedures and approval limit provision of adequate and regular humanitarian assistance especially to those who have been trapped in besieged and hard-to-reach areas:
- Absence of age and gender disaggregated information of population in need unable the sector to accommodate and target specific needs;
- Logistical constraints especially during inter-agency convoy such as, road blockage, presence of checkpoints, and presence of threats continue to hamper rapid distribution;
- Lack of actual data on distribution recipients prevent the sector to better measure the actual reached and served beneficiaries:
- Limited and irregular monitoring of distribution due to insecurity and sensitivities compromise the ability of the sector to assess the impact of its assistance and better inform future planning;
- Absence of clear and effective feedback mechanism from population in need due to information gathering sensitivities unable the sector to better determine the efficacy of its effort;
- Lack of income generating opportunities to provide the necessary financial means continues to hamper access to basic household items among the most vulnerable population in need;
- Diminishing active participation among sector members affects coordination and the overall sectorial reach;
- Inexact coordination structure impacts the level of efficiency in coordinating sectorial response;
- Lack of reliable consolidated information on inter-agency convoy reach hampers the sector to determine the extent and impact of its convoy contribution.

CRISIS BACKGROUND: The civil unrest in Syrian Arab Republic that started in March 2011 has transformed into a multi-sided armed conflict that displaced around 6.5 million people and forced around 4.2 million people out of the country to seek asylum. As per the Humanitarian Needs Overview in 2016, around 13.5 million people are in need of humanitarian support of which around 5.3 million people are desperate to receive emergency shelter, essential household items and other multi-sectorial assistance as they continue to struggle in insecure areas. The degree of resilience and positive coping mechanism of the affected population have reduced due to the protracted nature of the conflict. Purchasing power and the ability to provide for their basic household needs have decreased due to economic recession that left thousands of Syrian people unemployed and the prospect of accessing essential household items has also declined due to closure of essential service providers.



PARTNER IN FOCUS

Syrian Arab Red Crescent



The Syrian Arab Red Crescent (SARC) was founded in 1942 according to the Decree No. 540/1942 and the Decree No. 117/1966 that regulating the organization's work. It is an independent humanitarian organization of public utility and has a legal entity and enjoys financial and administrative independence.

SARC has been recognized by the International Committee of the Red Cross in Geneva (ICRC) in 1946 and it committed to Geneva Conventions and the seven basic principles of the International Movement of Red Cross and Red Crescent. SARC has headquarter in Damascus with 14 branches in 14 governorates of Syria and 75 of sub branches.

Since the beginning of the Syrian crisis, SARC has been playing a major role in providing humanitarian aid to all affected population and considered to be one of the major and most efficient national non-governmental organizations. Through successful partnerships with over 20 international organization (UN Agencies and INGOs), SARC is delivering multi-sectorial humanitarian aid to all people of concern in all accessible and even hard-to-reach and besieged areas through 8,000 volunteers with emphasis on the 7 main principles of the Red Cross/Crescent movement: humanity, impartiality, neutrality, independence, voluntary service, unity and universality.

SARC remains to date one of the active frontline agencies in delivering humanitarian aid even to the most insecure areas. High exposure to the field has always put their safety at stake. It is estimated that over 20 casualties were already reported from this agency since the beginning of the crisis.










